"I do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I will faithfully execute the Office of the President of the United States, and will to the best of my Ability, preserve, protect and defend the Constitution of the United States."

And, although not required, most Presidents have taken their oath on the Bible and I think all Presidents added "so help me God" at the end.

As one of your constituents, I am concerned that far too many public servants have forgotten that oaths mean something and that the Constitution (the rule of law) is to be respected. In their defense, it is highly likely that many who take such an oath do not know what they are promising to support because they have never really studied its meaning. How do you think Congress, for example, would do on a Constitution quiz?
