ARTICLE V

The Congress, whenever <u>two thirds</u> of both Houses shall deem it necessary, shall propose Amendments to this Constitution, or, on the Application of the Legislatures of <u>two thirds</u> of the several States, shall call a Convention for proposing Amendments, which, in either Case, shall be valid to all Intents and Purposes, as Part of this Constitution, when ratified by the Legislatures of <u>three fourths</u> of the several States, or by Conventions in <u>three fourths</u> thereof, as the one or the other Mode of Ratification may be proposed by the Congress; Provided that no Amendment which may be made prior to the Year <u>One thousand eight hundred and eight</u> shall in any Manner affect the <u>first and fourth Clauses in the Ninth Section of the first Article</u>; and that no State, without its Consent, shall be deprived of its equal Suffrage in the Senate.



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
